The evening's alumni awardees will have their names permanently displayed on the Alumni Award Wall which is showcased in the CCM Student Center.

#### Alumnus of the Year



**Daren A. Cortese '87** was completely honored to be chosen for this prestigious award. He has a special attachment to County College of Morris (CCM) and the education he received here. Daren obtained his A.S. degree in Business Administration, and continued his education at Trenton State College with a B.S. in Economics, followed by an M.S. in Business Administration from Johns Hopkins

University. He relocated to Baltimore, MD and began what has evolved into a 21-year career in the long-term care and healthcare industries, with extensive experience in merger and acquisitions/financial analysis, including the acquisition or divestiture of over 140 skilled nursing facilities with a combined value of over \$500 million.

Daren was inspired to start his own business after growing tired of working for large nursing home chains that put profits before patients. Currently, he is the President, Owner and Operator of Brinton Woods Senior Living, comprising four skilled nursing homes in Maryland and Washington, DC, with 555 beds. Brinton Woods offers a wide range of nursing and rehabilitation services to meet the needs of both long-term and short-term residents. Daren and his partners espouse that "as long as we take good care of our staff and our patients, everything else will fall into place."

Daren is a Director at Large with the Board of Directors of the Health Facilities Association of Maryland (HFAM). In December 2010, HFAM selected Daren to receive the "Gifted Spokesperson for HFAM and the Provider Community" award.

A single father of son Evan, 7, and daughter Olivia, 10, his career and children take up most of his time. He is a member of the Chesapeake Down Syndrome Parent Support Group. Daren comes to New Jersey several times a year to visit family and strengthens his connection to CCM through his generosity to the CCM Foundation.

# Alumna Kathryn Hansen Combines Business Success with Unique Gym Ownership

Kathryn Hansen '06 and her husband are relatively new to the world of entrepreneurship. The recently married couple opened a CrossFit affiliate in Warwick New York in September 2010, shortly after Kathryn completed her Master's degree from Drew University. "Time wise, it was the perfect opportunity. We're both CrossFit certified. My husband works as a corrections officer, but I was free to commit myself to the gym and to the growth of our business," she said.

CrossFit is a core strength and conditioning program that combines weightlifting, sprinting and gymnastics. CrossFit athletes run, row, jump rope, use Olympic weightlifting techniques, dumbbells, gymnastics rings, and kettlebells, and perform bodyweight exercises, such as pull-ups, push-ups and squats. The Hansen's affiliate stresses both the physical side of well being and the nutritional.

Classes at affiliated CrossFit gyms typically include a warm up, a skill development segment, and the high

intensity workout of the day (WOD). Kathryn believes the class format is a key success factor that offers something individual workouts do not. "When you participate in a class, you're more accountable. Working out with others brings out your competitive spirit and motivates you to push yourself harder, and it's always fun to share the pain," she explained.

## A Day-In-The-Life Of A CrossFit Affiliate Owner

Kathryn's day starts as early as 4:30 a.m. to prepare for the first CrossFit class, which begins at 5:30 am. She conducts three additional morning classes, and on certain days, offers skills or foundation classes.

After morning classes, Kathryn attends to the administrative and marketing aspects of running a business and planning community and promotional events.

In the late afternoon, Kathryn returns to the gym for three evening classes, with help from her husband when his schedule permits.

Kathryn is a big fan of the town that both she and her husband and her business call 'home. "Warwick is a great location. It's a small, quaint town that is very health-oriented," she commented. Kathryn hopes to add yoga classes to attract a wider range of members.

## Follow Your Dream

There's nothing better than owning your own business and, at the same time, being able to help people.

When asked what it takes to be successful in your own business, Kathryn responded with-

out hesitation "passion, dedication and inspiration." "My husband and I complement one another. He's the idea man. In fact, we would never have had the gym were it not for him. I'm better at the business side, taking care of the logistics, billing, our online presence, and those types of things." Kathryn's advice for those who are thinking about going into business: "Opening your own business is a risk – and it's ok be scared. But don't let that keep you from doing it – you need to follow your dream. Personally, I feel especially fortunate because there's nothing better than owning your own business and, at the same time, being in a position to help people," Kathryn said.

One of the business challenges that Kathryn faces is educating people about CrossFit. "We're not your typical gym. In essence, CrossFit is more like a personal training session. Every time you come in, you're coming to a class. We're constantly working on form and technique – you're never left on your own," she explained. Kathryn is a big fan of CCM. "I had a great experience, and as a result, I was able to continue on to Drew University on a very good scholarship to earn my bachelor's and Master's degrees. ## Visioning the Future A New Media Center for the County College of Morris

The Media Center at County College of Morris provides multimedia support for both the college and the community, offering everything from audio and television production for broadcast, to sound and video for computer programs, to presentations for classrooms, theatres, conferences and the Internet.

Television and video production has changed dramatically over the last 10 years, moving from a static, in-studio environment to a digital, high-definition environment that is virtually limitless. The only working television production studio in the CCM facility is becoming obsolete. Despite efforts to keep the equipment and facility in the best working order, there are limits. Some equipment cannot be repaired because the parts are no longer made.

In addition, the Media Center still utilizes analog format, while the industry has advanced to digital production and, increasingly, high-definition/digital production. Recording, production and editing equipment must be upgraded to keep pace with industry standards. To continue to serve our clients and prepare gradu-

ates for today's working environment, the Media Center at the County College of Morris must be renovated and updated.

*Visioning the Future*, the fundraising campaign to support a new Media Center, has been launched. The appropriate renovation of studios and editing facilities will result in a production facility of great flexibility and creativity. The campaign will offer many naming opportunities, as well as the chance to provide a new generation of CCM students training that rivals that of the finest academic institutions in our region. ### Hockey Team's .500 Record Belies Outstanding Offensive Season

One glance at the CCM hockey team's 13-13 record this past season and—well, one glance isn't nearly enough. Although the team overall record was middle of the road, they were 12-4 in Metropolitan Collegiate Hockey Conference games, and seven of their losses came against four teams in the top five in National Junior College Athletic Association rankings. And the numbers the Titans put up along the way definitely belonged in the fast lane. As a team, they led the MCHC in scoring with 135 goals and 159 assists for 294 points. When one player wasn't lighting the lamp several times in a game, another was.

Russian-born freshman **Mark Zavorin** recorded three goals or more an amazing nine times during the regular season—including the first three games of the year—and finished with 83 points on 53 goals and 30 assists. Sophomore **Dave McAndrew** also had an outstanding season, completing the year as the team's No. 2 scorer with 29 goals and 28 assists for 58 points.

In addition, freshman **Andrew Niedzwicki** chipped in with 16 goals and 22 assists in the Titans' 16 conference games, and freshman **Paul Modestino** made the most of his limited time on the ice, scoring 10 times and collecting 11 assists in only 14 games played.

Even players who didn't score a lot of goals all season got into the act at least once. **Tim Geiger** and **Cory Kendelski** each turned in two-goal, three-assist performances during the season, against St. Thomas Aquinas and Stevens Institute, respectively. **Dan Vandenheuvell** tallied a hat trick against Stevens. **Joe Drew** twice tallied two points in a game and had three assists in another. And **Bill Harrison** scored

three times and added an assist in an 8-6 victory over Wagner, then scored twice—including the game-winner in overtime—to beat Fordham.

All the scoring, though, would have been to no avail without solid goaltending. Statistically, **Jeremiah Dea** had the greatest single effort, stopping 57 of 63 shots in the defeat of Wagner. He finished the season unbeaten in six decisions with a 4.22 goals against average. **Chris Riccardi** won five of his six games and led the team with a 3.70 goals allowed per game.

### Lady Titans' Sophomore Volleyball Season Builds on First-Year Successes

In only its second year of existence, the CCM women's volleyball team reached an important milestone: a .500 record. The Lady Titans finished a more-than-respectable 9-9 this past season, including an upset of Delaware Tech in the Region XIX Tournament—the first time Del Tech had ever lost a match in the region tourney. "That was the biggest achievement of the season," said **Taras Borysyuk**, who is now 14-18 in two years as the Lady Titans' inaugural coach. "We also had a clean sweep of Union County College that helped us rebound from an 0-3 start to the year."

The Lady Titans broke a couple of individual records. **Jessica Haskin**, a sophomore from Landing and a first-team All-Region XIX selection, led the team in kills, and also broke her own mark with 168 this past season. She had 16 kills in a regular-season loss to Del Tech, and 18 one week later in a victory at Northampton of Pennsylvania.

**Casey Brennan**, a freshman from Sparta and another first-team Region XIX all-star—including being named the region's top defensive player—finished the season with a record 255 digs, including 10 at home against Northampton. She also served five aces in the same match, and in a September loss to Del Tech won 27 points on her serve.

**Amy Cooper**, a freshman from Randolph, also turned in some excellent performances. She had five aces and 15 serving points in the loss to Del Tech and served five consecutive aces in the road victory against Northampton. Cooper added five aces and seven kills in an October victory over Lackawanna (PA) College.

### One of the Greatest Seasons Ever for Men's Soccer

The CCM men's soccer team's Fall 2010 season was like a broken record – actually, several of them. The Titan men turned in one of their greatest seasons of all time—certainly one of the best in the 20-year term of head coach **Roger Stephens**—en route to a 19-4 record and their second national junior college Final Four appearance in the last three years.

"This team is certainly up there with the team that went to the NJCAA Final Four in 2008," notes **Stephens**, who has amassed an impressive 233-96-16 record in his two decades at CCM.

Along the way, the Titans repeated as Garden State Athletic Conference champions and won the Region XIX and District E titles. It was a group that felled individual and team records or notched impressive accomplishments with regularity. Those feats included:

- A home unbeaten streak that reached 28 games, dating back to Sept. 11, 2008.
- The fifth Region XIX Player of the Year since 2002, **Nick Fischer**, a sophomore midfielder from Rockaway. **Fischer** also was a first-team National Junior Collegiate Athletic Association all-American.
- Two players voted in the top five in the region and earning NJCAA all-America honors—**Fischer** and **Ryan Hurdes**, a sophomore forward from Succasunna. **Hurdes** also finished in the top 10 in scoring in the nation, with 19 goals—including five game-winners—and 14 assists. He was a first-team all-region pick and second-team all-American.
- A record-tying 12 shutouts from goalkeeper **Cody Sherman**, a sophomore from Denville and third-team all-region selection.
- In addition to **Fischer**, **Hurdes** and **Sherman**, two players earned all-region honors,—**Dave Pryzbylo** (second team), a sophomore forward from Denville, and **George Mikula** (third team), a sophomore midfielder from Rockaway.
- A No. 5 ranking heading into the national tournament.

"It was truly a pleasure and privilege to coach such an outstanding group of student athletes," says Stephens.

### Women's Soccer Suffers First Sub-par Season in Eight Years

Despite being led by a pair of all-Region XIX selections from the previous season, the 2010 Lady Titans soccer team was faced with enduring the graduation of all-America nominee **Laura Mejia**, a small roster, and a curtailed season. All of those hurdles combined for a 4-10 season—the women's first losing campaign in eight years.

"It is extremely hard to get a new group of girls every year and expect them to mesh right away," third-year coach Gazwan Ihssan told The Youngtown Edition. "At the junior-college level it is extremely difficult to keep the same players for more than a year."

The Lady Titans had a few bright spots this past fall. They closed the season with four victories in their final six games, including an 8-0 thrashing of Salem Community College. In those four wins, the women held their opponents to a total of three goals.

This year's team was led by sophomore co-captains **Kellie Funk** from East Hanover and **Renae McEvoy** of Wharton. Funk, a second-team all-region player in 2009, was one of the top scorers in the nation.

**McEvoy**, who earned first-team all-region honors last year, anchored the Lady Titans' midfield. And at one point this season, **Robin Rozembersky**, a freshman midfielder from Succasunna, was in the top 10 in scoring in the region.

### Men's Basketball Squad Returns to Winning Ways

Following a season when their roster was replete with freshmen and their record was a disappointing 7-22—and that only thanks to a 7-9 stretch midway through the year—the CCM men's basketball team rebounded, no pun intended, last fall.

A solid group of sophomores are slated to return for the 2011-2012 season which should make for a promising year.

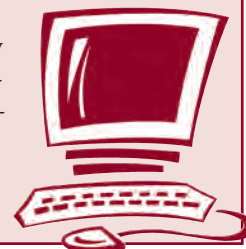
