I started going to different schools when I was three. When I was younger, I felt that nobody understood me and that caused me to act out sometimes. Once I went to the Newmark School in Scotch Plains, NJ and then Montgomery Academy in Basking Ridge, NJ everything got easier because people there understood how I thought and learn.

Join Titus in trying Titan Trot

The end of CCM's 50 anniversary is coming to a close, and they wish to see it off with one last hurrah in the form of Titan Weekend.

Titan Weekend is an event which involves the Titan Ball on May 3, Titus' Birthday on May 4, and the Titan Trot on May 5.

The Titan Trot is a USA Track & Field certified Sunday 5K, where anyone can participate for \$28 and can cross the fivekilometer distance however they can or want to. The race starts at 9 a.m. and will continue for the rest of the day until all participants have completed the event.

William McHugh, Instructor in the Department of Health & Exercise Science, is spearheading the soon to be Titan Trot, which was advertised as a great way to excite students, alumni, and teachers alike.

"It's not every day you get a chance to run in a 5K," he said. "It gives everyone a chance to really

challenge themselves, and make them feel like they did something worthwhile."

McHugh said the event is a great way to facilitate a healthy lifestyle and do something out of one's comfort zone, as a rare event like this can excite people, making it more active. But he also sees it as an opportunity for students, teachers, and alumni to come together.

The run aims to have over 200 participants, which is on a much larger scale than the normal 50 or 100 person groups the Titan Trot committee is used to running. Managing sponsorships with groups such as the Randolph Pain Relief and Wellness Center, as well as trying to find good incentives for people to attend like the first 200 registrars getting t-shirts, means that the staff has some heavy responsi-

"We're still looking for volunteers, primarily for registration, "said McHugh. "Because with the size of the event and its current attendance, we're being stretched very thin."

This event is also a way for CCM to generate revenue, as well as give opportunities for others to meet other participants, put their attendance on a résumé, and to give back to the community. Students like Kaitlin Ventrice are a large part of the advertising for the event, who helped by giving students a six week plan to prepare for the Trot.

"I worked really hard on a good workout program, in the hopes that any person could go from sitting on the couch, to ready to run in six weeks," she

Pilot program proposal plans for free two-year community colleges

New Jersey Gov. Phil Murphy is proposing a plan that will make the first two years of community college free for students. This program will start to be available at 13 pilot schools across New Jersey. Murphy's proposal has support by some of the County College of Morris students and staff.

The pilot schools will be in the following counties: Atlantic Cape, Bergen, Camden, Cumberland, Hudson, Mercer, Middlesex, Ocean, Passaic, Rowan, Salem, Union, and Warren.

"The pilot program will allow students coming from families with incomes between \$0 to \$45,000 access to the awards. Students must maintain satisfactory academic progress in order to remain qualified," according to ABC News.

Murphy said to ABC News that he plans on this bill by growing the middle class and jumpstarting the economy by investing in our residents.

"Making community college tuition free will help New Jersey's young people and working adults earn post-secondary degrees to advance their careers, and it will help build the talented workforce that is the engine of our state's economy," Murphy said.

Sydnie Goshin is a liberal arts major at CCM. She lives in Essex County and attends CCM as an out of county student. Goshin is in agreement with Murphy's tuition plan, in addition to his plan to increase the minimum wage over a period of five years.

"I think it's a good incentive for students," Goshin said. "It's not just, 'go to a two-year college, do whatever and get a degree'. It will push people to take college seriously instead of not going to classes."

Goshin plans on pursuing social work at a four-year university after graduating from CCM.

"If you have to work hard to go to college for free — I think that would really help," said Goshin. "I know price has a part in whether or not people will even consider going to college."

Dr. Robb Lauzon is a Communications Professor at CCM. Like Goshin, he is fully on board with Murphy's proposal.

"I think it would make it a better experience; it would expand access," Lauzon said. "If you had free two-year schooling, it would open up two-year schooling to everyone that wanted it instead of anybody who thought they could afford it, which would make the community college experience much more similar to how it is out-of-country."

Lauzon attended a community college when starting his college career and believes that was the best way to begin. He looks forward to seeing the positive impact this proposal will have on society when the program gets enacted.

"Society would have to shift," Lauzon said. "We would ultimately become a more knowledge-based society instead of a manufacturing-based society."

Julien Plummer, a business major at CCM, had a similar opinion as Goshin and Lauzon, he said that he foresees nothing but positive outcomes as a result of Murphy's plan to increase access to community colleges across New Jersey.

"I didn't hear about this plan before. But I think it would definitely be a good thing because I wouldn't have to pay for the first two years," Plummer said. "Definitely more people would go to college."

Students express concern for climate change

Global climate change is a sign of how human activities have made significant effects on the environment. It is a topic that has been hotly debated from the halls of government to the campus of CCM where some students have opinions about what so many consider a crisis. Human-made air pollutants have caused the Earth to undergo abnormal warming temperatures within the last century. According to the Carbon Disclosure Project, 100 companies made up 71 percent of carbon emissions since 1988, however, individuals can still make efforts to learn about how they can lower carbon emissions in their own lives.

Nydia Betancur, 22, a business administration major, said climate change is an important concern; however, as a population, individuals failed to remember the existence of the consequences of climate change.

"Honestly, it's easy to forget that that's a huge issue in the world right now," Betancur said. "Since it's a topic that's not in the news or on headlines daily, I definitely don't pay much attention to it."

As wildfires, hurricanes, and heatwaves struck the Earth last summer, mainstream media offer limited focus on the threats imposed by climate change. According to ICE CaPs' chart of 2000-2019 US Television Coverage of Climate Change or Global

Warming, CNN outpaced the other U.S. based televised media groups for coverage of global warming all throughout the summer of 2018, and continues to do so today. "My whole family recycles," Betancur said. "We reuse plastic shopping bags all the time, and any plastic or glass containers or cardboard boxes are always separated and recycled."

Recycling reduces the amount of waste sent to land-fills. By collecting and processing materials which could be thrown away, recycling prevents pollution by reducing the need to gather new raw materials.

Erin Young, 18, a nursing major, said she tries to be mindful of her carbon footprint for the sake of reducing greenhouse gases in the atmosphere, which avoids global warming.

"It's scary to think that if people don't learn how to take care of the planet, there's just gonna be even more destructive hurricanes and natural disasters," Young said. "Who knows if future kids will get to see the landmarks and creatures that exist today."

In 2018, the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change report warned humankind that there are only approximately a dozen years left for humanity to get their act together and prevent the worst repercussions of climate change.

"My parents installed solar panels on the roof of our house a few years ago," Young said. "During the summer, my mom refuses to use the dryer. She always hangs clothes in the backyard to dry."

Professors at Northwestern University said lessening the amount of carbon dioxide released into the air can be achieved by using compact fluorescent light bulbs, walking or riding bikes, and carpooling.

Victoria Ragan, 18, an early childhood education major, said County College of Morris does have an environmentally friendly atmosphere throughout the campus. Having classified trash disposals, recycling unwanted textbooks, and solar panels reflect CCM's efforts to be green. This environment reflects her views on being conscious of taking care of the planet.

"There are water dispensers all over campus that can only be used with a reusable water bottle," Ragan said. "There are separate trash cans that are classified by glass, plastic or other."

"All the earthquakes and hurricanes happening is a reflection of how we are treating the planet," Ragan said. "The most challenging part about being ecofriendly is you can do everything in your power to recycle, reduce waste and energy use, but you're only one person in the world."

There are countless variables influencing our world, and nearly as many opinions on the topic of changes affecting it. CCM is no exception in regards to the variety of thought to be found on this conundrum of climate.

Asez looking for members to help protect the planet

CCM's newest club is on a mission to save the Earth

Asez, Save the Earth from A to Z, is the newest club at County College of Morris (CCM) and has been active for about a month now. The club was chartered by the Student Government Association (SGA) on March 19, and since becoming official the club has already gotten involved in projects working within the local area and with other nearby community colleges.

Asez is a volunteer organization based on the 17 goals of the United Nations. Each goal has its own focus and each chapter of Asez can choose which goals they want to work on. The CCM chapter meets twice a week on Mondays from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. and Thursdays from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m. Each meeting reviews previous events from chapters all across the world and then uses these as inspiration to create local events and activities for the local area. The meetings also include bible studies.

All the Asez groups are connected through the Church of God, which is where many of the chapters are located. There are about 9,000 church locations giving Asez a very large global presence. There are many Asez groups at four-year colleges and recently many two year colleges have joined in. The hope is that when students transfer from their two-year school to a four-year school they will continue to participate in Asez.

When it comes to planning and attending events, most of the activities so far have been community cleanups in hopes of a safer and cleaner environment. The group is also planning to talk to the local fire and police departments to see how they can help reduce visual signs of crime, such as graffiti or damaged property. They are also willing to plan events and activities with other clubs at CCM.

Asez member Horlalie Badasu recently joined and participated in her first event.

"I have always had a passion for helping others and the fact that I can help change someone's life makes me feel very content," said Badasu.

Recently the CCM Asez group worked with the Bergen Community College and Essex County College Asez groups to do a cleanup event in Paterson. These groups stay in communication with each other to see what each chapter is doing and if there are projects they can work on together. They also try to make sure they do not create the same events in order to try to work on as many of the United Nations goals as possible

"It's a great thing to know what they are doing in order to do something similar, but not the same," said Gina Velasquez, the Vice President of Asez.

The CCM Asez group also plans to participate in the Dover clean up on May 11 at 8 a.m. They are also trying to set up an event in Morris County for the end of the semester.

Asez President Daniel M. Velasquez recommends CCM students to join for new experiences and a better connection with the community.

"This taught me to be more selfless," Velasquez said, "We help strengthen CCM and all the communities around us."

Despite My Diagnosis... Finding the good in chronic pain

Two decades ago I underwent surgery to repair two ruptured discs at the base of my spine that had robbed me of motor control in my left leg and caused me considerable pain for almost six months.

At the time I was a junior and an undergraduate and ended up missing a large portion of the academic year. I had just started seriously dating someone and I did not know whether this new relationship could weather the ups and downs of this serious physical infirmity. Epidural and steroid injections, limited mobility and chronic pain had become a steady part of my life.

I wish I could tell you that the surgery fixed everything and twenty years later as adjunct professor and faculty advisor to the Youngtown Edition I face each day pain-free.

But I would be lying.

Because it was after my surgery I was diagnosed with spinal stenosis. The doctors told me that this narrowing of my spinal canal was something I was born with and eventually the passage would narrow enough to constrain the nerves and put me in a wheelchair.

This was going to be exacerbated by the scar tissue left over by my surgery. Less space in the canal for the nerves to move freely, after all. I was also going to deal with varying levels of pain for the rest of my life. I wish I could tell you that I began exercising and dieting in earnest and did everything I could better my odds.

That would also be a lie.

After surgery, I went back to campus, cane in hand and got special permission to take 25 credits a semester to graduate on time and continue on my path to graduate

school. I also ate my way to 400 pounds and dealt with the grinding of chronic pain with prescription anti-inflammatory and pain medication.

Dealing with chronic pain is something that so many people experience but never talk about. The way it may take you ten minutes to get out of bed in the morning when others take ten seconds. The way it gnaws at your attention span when you are trying to focus on work or school. The way the pain activates your adrenal gland and wears you out. Chronic pain makes you so very very tired. It also makes you jealous. You are jealous of the people around you who aren't suffering as you do. Not because you would wish this on them, but because they take for granted what they have. That physical normalcy

you have been denied.

I wrote this, not because this is a pity party for me, but because I was so inspired and humbled by the previous Despite My Diagnosis columns written by brave authors who shared their stories with Youngtown.

And because I know that so many people deal with varying levels of chronic pain and choose to suffer in silence or be isolated because they are afraid they might snap or be quick-tempered with someone. But chronic pain can also do something unexpectedly beautiful.

It can make you appreciate what you do have.

On the days when your pain is more manageable, you appreciate being able to walk freely, to transition from a seated position to standing without wincing. You appreciate being able to mow your lawn, or walk through a store or take a day trip to the beach. You appreciate the friends and family who love you and care about you and support you. And that builds a reserve of strength you can draw on in your darker days.

But you have to do your part. I did change my lifestyle. I exercise daily to keep myself mobile (it takes a lot of work to look this mediocre) and I did lose over 100 pounds I needed to lose. I no longer take prescription medication for pain management. I take the occasional Aleve. And I also sought counseling and help.

So for those of you out there with chronic pain, don't be afraid to ask for help. Do not suffer in silence. Don't be afraid to explain

to people what is happening with you and ask for their patience and support. It is okay to have bad days. It is okay to feel depressed and to feel your lot in life is unfair. It is not okay to let those feelings overwhelm you. Lean on those relationships that provide you comfort.

I made it because I had people who believed in me. I had an undergraduate advisor who put herself out there for me and supported me and guided me and set the template for how I treat my own students. I still text her daily. I had family and friends who were there when I woke up in the hospital and continued to be a presence in my daily life.

Those relationships that are meant to be will strengthen. That girl I was in the new relationship with 20 years ago when I had my surgery is my wife of 13 years.

For those of you who know someone with chronic pain, do your best to be patient. Celebrate the days they feel well and listen to them when they are feeling down. I still have my bad days, when the pain and weakness creeps down my leg. Usually when the weather changes.

So despite my diagnosis, I am a journalist, father, husband, educator, advisor, improv-artist, video-game enthusiast, Union President, and adjunct professor.

But because of my diagnosis, I appreciate, and enjoy, those opportunities more than I will ever be able to express.

Editorial: Despite My Diagnosis is more than its name

Students can identify with the Despite My Diagnosis series, with stories about people with severe and often brutal alterations to their life being overcome by sheer force of will alone. It speaks to the human desire to see others succeed in the face of adversity. But what can be just as inspirational is all the work that goes into it behind the scenes ever since day one by its writers and original creators.

Raven Resch, Human Services major, Active Minds president, and one of the three creators of the series, says that it began as a contemporary social issues project. She said that she felt mental illness was being misrepresented in media, and because of this, wanted to show people how someone with issues like these could be seen as perfectly functional, despite any hardships they may be going through.

"Mental illness is so stigmatized, and I feel like that's because of how it's shown in media today," Resch said. "There are so many people thriving with mental illness, which just aren't shown on TV or online."

In the Fall of 2018, Resch wanted to collaborate with another club for the purpose of spreading awareness on the topic, so she worked together with the president of the Writers Club, Marco Mirlas, and they brainstormed a rough outline of how they envisioned the series would go. The subject matter was broadened to handicaps, such as anything from leukemia to depression, and pitched to current Editor-in-Chief and Hospitality major Alexa Wyszkowski early that winter.

Wyszkowski said that she loved the idea and even gave some of her own suggestions for the series, such as the usage of the iconic whiteboard in every picture for the series. Since then, Mirlas and Resch have had their DMD stories published, and Wyszkowski soon plans to have her own published. The subject matter has been anything from anxiety to ADD, but always manages to be harsh, relatable, and moving all at once.

"The central theme of the project has always been to inspire other people dealing with problems, physical or mental, in our own styles," Mirlas said.

The series has had seven different iterations since its beginning on Jan. 30, with pieces like Rachel Eckert's "Hold on, pain ends", Matthew Bristol's "Despite My Diagnosis... I still find ways to laugh", or Catrina Bennett's "Despite My Diagnosis... I refuse to be a statistic". Each of them has a problem and solution unique to them, with writing that can tell more about them and their strength of will then anyone may realize

was to give people a platform to tell their stories. Many of the people presented in the articles have life-changing problems but have looked or acted like any of their peers. The importance of realizing how much these individuals struggle with on a daily basis cannot be understated, even as they themselves may undercut these

"It (the writing of the articles) can be a load off students' shoulders," Resch said. "It gives them an outlet."

The articles have brought their writers closer to their audience, as many learned about and empathized with the plight of the authors as they read along. Sites such as Morris County Stigma Free have been posting the articles since Feb. 14. bringing even more exposure to the writers.


Sometimes the nature of exposure can be something a bit more personal. Wyszkowski met Bennett for the first time after a brief email exchange when talking to her for her DMD article, where Wyszkowski was moved by Bennett's sincerity and brav-

"(We were) just three clubs working together, and the honesty (writers have shown) allows for connection," Wyskzowski said. "The writing is really powerful, and allows people to express themselves."

All three writers have shared opinions of being incredibly humbled by the series' success, and by how peers often talk to them about how much they loved the series.

"What makes me know it's a success is whenever I find out someone at CCM has read a piece from this project, whoever's it is and was inspired on some level by it," Mirlas said. "That has been our mission, and to accomplish it feels satisfying."

Cannabis: the good, the bad, the legal?

Marijuana usage has long been stigmatized as an activity done by slackers, delinquents, and the gateway to harder drugs, despite this factor the drug has been gaining support in the United States. According to the Pew Research Center, in 1969, 12 percent of Americans have approved of marijuana legalization. This has risen to 62 percent. April is national Cannabis awareness month Registrar at National Day Calendar, with a focus on educating people about the potentials of the Cannabis

According to the Encyclopedia of Britannica, cannabis is a plant that has its origins in Central Asia, but is now being cultivated globally for a variety of purposes, from the creation of hemp products like plastics, paper, hemp fiber boards, and hemp jewelry, to its usage as a psychedelic drug.

"A tall canelike variety is raised for the production of hemp fiber," said Kara Rodgers, Senior Editor for the Encyclopedia of Britannica, "While the female plant of a short branchier variety is prized as the more abundant source of the psychoactive substance tetrahydrocannabinol (THC), the active ingredient of marijuana."

Despite the plurality of the

American people supporting the legalization of Marijuana with the passage of the Controlled Substance Act of 1970, the U.S government has classified marijuana as a schedule-1 drug. This means that the government has classified the substance as having no medical use, high risk of abuse, and severe safety concerns. Marijuana shares it's schedule-1 status with cocaine, LSD, and heroin.

Although legally marijuana is said to have no medical benefits, 33 states, including New Jersey, have passed laws that legalize medical marijuana that can be prescribed to citizens that are afflicted with certain medical ailments. Peter Grinspoon, M.D and contributing editor at Harvard Health Publishing, wrote in an article titled "Medical Marijuana," that the medical marijuana is used as an alternative to addictive opioid drugs when it comes to treating pain relief.

"While marijuana isn't strong enough for severe pain (for example, post-surgical pain or a broken bone)," Grinspoon said. "it is quite effective for the chronic pain that plagues millions of Americans, especially as they age. Part of its allure is that it is clearly safer than opiates (it is impossible to overdose on and far less addictive) and it can take the place of NSAIDs (Nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drug) such as Advil or Aleve if people

can't take them due to problems with their kidneys or ulcers or GERD."

Grinspoon also mentions that medical marijuana has been showing positive research results when it comes to treating military veterans with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder.

"A highly promising area of research is its use for PTSD in veterans who are returning from combat zones," Grinspoon said. "Many veterans and their therapists report drastic improvement and clamor for more studies, and for a loosening of governmental restrictions on its study."

According to the Addiction Center, although marijuana withdrawal symptoms does not have the same physical side effects as heroin and cocaine, the psychological effects of marijuana withdrawal lead the user to behavioral disorders.

Possible symptoms of marijuana withdrawal could include anxiety, trouble sleeping, and irritability. More severe behavioral disorders include depression, insomnia, and reduced appetite and weight.

Also according to the addiction center, in 2012, 950,000 people have received some form of treatment for marijuana use. Marijuana treatment centers focus on having support group therapies and cognitive behavioral therapy for patients who suffer from the more serious psy-

chological effects of the drug.

Andreas Loizou, a digital media major, has read up on the subject of marijuana which has shown that there are benefits to the drug.

"I don't personally use it," Loizou said. "But I've read up on it and think there are some good things about it, there are things that are legal now that I feel are much more dangerous than marijuana."

Loizou mentions that he is unsure about how accurate the current stigma of marijuana is.

"I don't know really know how true they are I don't like generalizing," Loizou said. "One of the stigmas of alcohol is that it makes people more aggressive and I think that's somewhat accurate, so maybe in some cases they (stigmas) are true."

Recently the N.J. State Legislature failed to get a vote on a bill that would legalize recreational marijuana usage in N.J. due to lack of Democratic support for it.

New Jersey's full legal recreational marijuana bill would be the second in the nation behind Vermont to try and pass it legislatively as opposed to a public referendum like California, Massachusetts, and Colorado.

Recreational marijuana refers to using marijuana to intentionally change one's state of mind in order to change emotion, perception, and feelings. According to the state of Oregon's page on recreational marijuana, the difference between recreational grade marijuana and medicinal grade marijuana is that the levels of THC are higher in medicinal.

"Medical grade means marijuana items that have a higher THC concentration limit compared to items sold to recreational customers," according to oregon.gov. "For example a recreational customer can buy a package of edibles that contains up to 50 mg of THC and each serving size in that package can be up to 5mg of THC. A medical grade edible sold to an OMMP (Oregon Medical Marijuana Program) registered patient can contain up to 100 mg of THC per package and there is no maximum serving size for medical grade edibles."

In his recent budget, New Jersey Gov. Phil Murphy is expecting the revenue from the recreational marijuana industry to reach over \$80,000,000 between the sale of recreational and medicinal marijuana, Murphy's budget is assuming a tax of \$42 per ounce of recreational marijuana.

Murphy addressed that he would not sign a legalization bill unless the bill expunges nonviolent drug possession charges from criminal records during his March 5 budget address.

"I will only sign this if it expunges the records of those who have been put through our criminal justice system for prior marijuana offenses," Murphy said.

Cameron Hogan, a liberal arts major, agrees with having recreational marijuana be legalized.

"I mean treat it like alcohol, right," Hogan said. "Make sure the person is 21-years-old, properly regulate the stuff so that way people are not mixing it with harmful chemicals and products."

Hogan also said that teaching people how to use the drug and to warn them of the dangers should be advocated for.

"It's like a psychedelic if you aren't used to it or completely ignorant to the change of mind," Hogan said. "Everyone who is willing to take any drug should know the consequences of taking said drug, I hope that's the lesson that we learned from the past when we were told that cigarettes were fun-sticks."
