## INNOVATION MEETS PHILANTHROPY

This fall, the **Paragano Family** Foundation Healthcare Simulation Center will open!

CCM has trained half of the nurses and roughly 90 percent of the respiratory therapists in Morris County. Our programs are focused on addressing medical and mental health needs - ensuring that our community receives the best care.

Through the generosity of Eileen Paragano and the Paragano Family Foundation, CCM will bring together Nursing, Respiratory Therapy, Radiography, Drug Counseling and other healthcare programs, to create an enhanced clinical teaching space configured to replicate a medical center. Clinical scenarios will include Pediatric, Critical Care, Emergency Room, Labor and Delivery. The

center will contain six patient beds, a private debriefing room, a Simulation Control room and a separate classroom.

The 13,000 square foot center is not only a state-of-theart facility with medical classrooms, but also a unique teaching opportunity that will allow CCM students from all healthcare programs to work together in an integrated manner just as they will in area hospitals where they will work together to save lives and improve the quality of healthcare for all.

We look forward to welcoming you to New Jersey's most innovative simulation center, which would not be possible without caring donors like Eileen Paragano and her family foundation.

## HONORING A BROTHER'S INCREDIBLE IMPACT BY

MAKING AN IMPACT

**John W. Kennedy, Ph.D.**, is the former CEO of New Jersey Manufacturing Extension Program (NJMEP), a private, not-for-profit organization that improves the profitability and competitiveness of New Jersey's manufacturers. This year, he established the William J. "Billy" Kennedy Jr. Memorial Scholarship in honor of his big brother who was his hero for many reasons.

Billy started on the Madison High School Dodger Football Teams that won five straight State Titles. He was also incredibly gifted with his hands; able to see something and repeat it physically. It was not until John was in college that he realized Billy's tremendous ability to work with his hands was a way of coping with his learning disabilities, including dyslexia and ADHD.

John was blessed with some simple gifts - to read and recall. Math came easily to him, but Billy had to fight to learn; however, once he knew something, he knew it forever. He was incredibly smart but struggled in school. In 1968, Billy joined the first class (ever) to enroll at CCM. While certain courses gave him issues, he thrived in the technical and business courses providing the foundation for a successful 40-year technical career at JCP&L. Billy always said that CCM made a bigger difference to him than would ever be noted.

Just as Billy's career was getting started, his father passed away, causing him without hesitation to step in and provide the caring, loving support his brothers needed. Never backing away from responsibility, Billy was also a good husband for 40+ years to Nelia, father to Chad and Katie, and best friend, mentor and hero to John. Upon Billy's

passing from Parkinson's disease in 2022, John felt there was no better way to honor his brother's legacy than with a gift to CCM to support students in the manufacturing workforce development program.

### **IMPROVING LIVES** AND CHANGING COMMUNITIES



Born and raised in Elizabeth, NJ, **Terry Ryan '75** was a proud CCM alum where he was the captain of the men's basketball team, 3rd all-time career assists leader and one of Coach Martin's top point guards. He always liked to say that if it were not for his 5'7" stature, he would have been the next Larry Bird. Terry was inducted into the CCM Athletic Hall of Fame in 2019.

As a vice president of Pepsi-Cola, Terry was able to give back to junior college athletes by becoming instrumental in establishing the Pepsi/Natycaa Cup, which recognizes athletic excellence in two-year college programs on the national level. Terry's family honored his legacy of athletics and generosity by creating the Terry

#### National Board of Respiratory Care Scholarship

The mission of the **National Board of Respiratory Care (NBRC)** is to promote excellence in respiratory care by awarding credentials based on high competency standards. Nearly 40,000 candidates test for NBRC credentials each year, seeking to demonstrate how excellence defines them across seven specific areas of respiratory care.



CCM's respiratory therapy program boasts full-time and adjunct faculty who have diverse educational and professional backgrounds, as well as a very low faculty-to-student ratio in the classroom, laboratory

and clinical setting. Students have access to a technologically advanced education. The Respiratory Therapy Laboratory is state-of-the-art and equipped with ventilators, intubation devices, spirometers and arterial blood gas monitors. Realistic clinical simulation is done using high-fidelity mannequins that are linked to computer software enabling students to be well-prepared for the workplace.

The NBRC recognizes the value of a CCM education in the field of respiratory therapy and wanted to create more access to the program by establishing a scholarship to support these students at CCM.

He received the Fund for Veteran Students and Families Scholarship and is grateful for the opportunity of an education that will make a difference in many lives.

**Juan Isaiz** is a Marine Corps and U.S. Army Veteran from Texas. He joined the Marines at 19 years old and served from 2012 to 2016 as an M1A1 Tank Crewman in 29 Palms, CA. He credits the Marines for teaching him principles of honor and brotherhood and carries these principles with him to this day. Part of his story as a veteran is also his struggle to cope with substance abuse, anxiety and depression, which is common among veterans. During his time in the Marines, Juan received care, but it was not enough, so he ventured on his own spiritual journey to transform himself and help others as well. The experience included walking from his home state of Texas to Chicago, IL to live with a fellow Marine brother and joining the U.S. Army

live with a fellow Marine brother and joining the U.S. Army as an infantry soldier. The Army stationed him at Arlington National Cemetery where he served as part of the funeral ceremony guard for two years. Juan commented, "I folded many flags for veterans and their loved ones and am forever grateful for the experience."

Most recently, Juan moved to New Jersey and chose to attend CCM because a friend recommended it as one of the best community colleges in the state. He chose to pursue dance and musical theatre because he believes art, music, and dance have the capacity to foster connection and transform experience into something positive. He thinks these disciplines can have an incredibly positive effect not only on veterans, but in the lives of everyone, if made more accessible.

### THE **BEST** DECISION

Despite his tireless efforts, **Kevin Rivera** felt hopeless. He wanted a college that would see him as a student, not a number. He received a recommendation to attend CCM, and ever since then, he knew it was the right decision. Kevin feels CCM has everything students need to succeed -- a convenient campus, caring professors and excellent instruction.



Kevin was accepted into

the competitive Respiratory Therapy program. In this accelerated program, he is challenged daily. However, he believes this makes him a better student both on campus and off campus. Having the opportunity to connect classroom learnings to real-world problems in hospitals is what Kevin feels is the most rewarding aspect of the program. Support from the CCM Foundation and the Office of Financial Aid have made Kevin's education possible. Kevin received the National Board of Respiratory Care Scholarship and is grateful for the support.

As a student at CCM, Kevin has learned to never stop pursuing your dreams and to keep moving forward despite obstacles one may encounter. ### BRINGING **MUSIC** TO DEAF EDUCATION

**Jacquelyn Briggs '12** chose to attend CCM after a severe car accident derailed her plans to enroll at a four-year university. The accident left her without hearing in her right ear. Despite her hearing loss, she chose to study music at CCM. Two years later Jackie graduated as a music major, also receiving an award in performing arts, and transferred to TCNJ as a vocal performance major.

After she finished her undergraduate degree in vocal performance, Jackie participated in multiple opera programs, including one in Italy. She became very invested in the crossover that exists in music and deaf education and wanted to be able to contribute more for individuals with hearing loss like her, so she began teaching early childhood music classes and working in early childhood centers. Jackie chose to continue her education at Teachers College, Columbia University and received two master's degrees in music education and deaf education.



Jackie now works as a Teacher of the Deaf at The Clarke Schools for Hearing and Speech with preschool-aged children with hearing loss who use listening equipment (such as hearing aids, cochlear implants, BAHAs) to learn to listen and speak. She uses a variety of musical techniques to help them learn to talk, participate in academics and participate in musical activities. She still sings, performs, and loves to show her cochlear implant, which she received four years ago. In the future she hopes to publish her latest project, writing deaf music curriculum.

Jackie recalls when she started at CCM she was a scared individual recovering from severe trauma, but being empowered by professors, mentors and friends she was capable of more than she ever thought possible. She believes this support was one of the largest steppingstones showing her that just because things were different than she originally planned, did not mean it could not be better than she ever imagined!

**Julian Gomez '96** graduated from CCM with an A.A. in Journalism. During his time on campus, he was active in the United Latino Association (ULA), United Nations Organization and the Youngtown student newspaper. As an English as a Second Language (ESL) student in high school, he found support in the ULA with students who spoke the

same language and shared the same culture. It was his participation in the student newspaper that helped him cross cultural barriers and provide another layer of support. Through this experience, he learned to be a student leader, photographer and editor.

After graduating CCM, Julian attended Rutgers University receiving his B.A. in Latin and Latino American Studies/Communication. Again, he was an active member of the student body participating on the Board of Latin American Students Association. After Rutgers he attended New Jersey City University receiving an M.A. in Multicultural Education. His professional career began at Bergen Community College as an admissions counselor and adjunct professor of ESL. He went on to become the associate director of admissions at Ramapo College of New Jersey and worked closely with first-generation

students and the Equity, Diversity and Inclusion Council. He also served as advisor to the Latino Student Organization.

As a longtime resident of Morris County, he was thrilled to return to his alma mater in 2022 as the Executive Director, Educational Opportunity Fund (EOF) and Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion. He never really left campus since he remained involved as a volunteer for the EOF program and a mentor to Dover College Promise students. He has always felt connected to CCM and is happy to be back supporting all students in his new role. He hopes his story will serve as an inspiration to others!

#### A FIRST STEP TOWARD REBUILDING: **ENGLISH AS A SECOND LANGUAGE CLASSES**



When Russia invaded Ukraine in February 2022, Khrystyna Sloan, 38, of Morris Plains, a student at County College of Morris (CCM). found herself frightened, horrified and depressed over what was happening to the people in her home country. Meanwhile in Ukraine, Viktoriia Zolotarova, 51, found her region the site of massive missile attacks that destroyed the area's electrical, gas, water and communications systems, along with hospitals, schools, banks, bridges and her home.

Hearing of such atrocities, Sloan, who left Ukraine at age 22, made a decision. "I could either remain depressed or focus on positivity," she says. Her answer was to serve as a volunteer at the Ukrainian American Cultural Center of New Jersey (UACCNJ) in Whippany. There she has helped organize fundraisers and collections to send an ambulance, bus, clothes, toys, diapers and other essential to the people of Ukraine, an effort. To help those who fled the as refugees, she became part of a group that approached CCM about providing free English as a Second Language (ESL) classes

at UACCNJ, so parents can learn while their

children participate in other activities.

Irena Kaler, director of Workforce Development and Community Partnerships at CCM, says they initially expected about 20 students would enroll for the classes - beginners and intermediate - that began in November. They ended up with more than double that amount, requiring opening another session of each class.

"The classes offered by CCM are a huge help for me and others," says Zolotarova, who while in Ukraine was the director of Europe's largest insurance group and is now a part-time cashier at Dollar General. She adds, "I am very grateful for the opportunity to study for free because at the moment. I earn no more than \$700 a month and cannot pay for my studies, and I need English like air."

Helping to cover the cost of instructors and textbooks are the pastors and

> church members the Presbytery of the Highlands of New Jersey. So far more than \$3,000 has been contributed to

provide ESL classes at UACCNJ. Kaler notes, "however, that as more Ukrainian refugees come into the area the demand will grow, and those in the beginner-level classes also will need to continue to advance."
