WHAT YOU WILL LEARN

The Journalism Program prepares students for careers in multimedia journalism. This includes specialization in particular beats such as sports, crime, government, politics, entertainment and education. Journalism also offers a highly transferable skillset, which is applicable to other professions including public relations, social media management, broadcasting, advertising and publishing.

Throughout the course of study in Journalism at County College of Morris (CCM), students will develop written communication skills alongside modern storytelling techniques in digital media formats. Students also employ a variety of software programs and applications that are standard in the industry today.

WHY STUDY JOURNALISM AT CCM?

Students work in a state-of-the-art, multi-purpose journalism classroom with access to the full Adobe suite. Professor John Soltes teaches all core courses and is a graduate of the prestigious Columbia University Graduate School of Journalism. He is also the author of a wide variety of publications, including work published in the New York Times and The Guardian.

In addition, CCM publishes The Youngtown Edition, which began printing in 1968 and is one of the oldest community college newspapers in the nation. Scholarship opportunities are available for those who work on the campus newspaper.

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
