Table of Hope Returns to CCM Campus

Table of Hope will be returning to CCM for a mobile food distribution and back-to-school backpack giveaway for Morris County residents on Saturday, August 29. Table of Hope regularly distributes food in towns within the county. This distribution is a county-wide event with leadership from Morris County coming together to demonstrate caring and the understanding that food insecurity issues are very present and have increased during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Approximately 30 to 40 volunteers are needed to assist with packaging up bags of food and then placing the bags into cars. About 600 families are expected to come. Volunteers need to arrive at 8:30 a.m. and should wear comfortable clothes (Titan Tuesday attire) and closed-toed shoes. The distribution begins at 10:30 a.m. and concludes at 12:30 p.m.

Simplifying the Process to Enroll for Fall 2020

CCM is offering students a number of options for taking classes this Fall Semester, along with a full range of online support services, so they can keep moving forward during these challenging times.

Since the college is unable to hold in-person registration sessions this summer, the Enrollment and Retention Group has designed a web page to simplify the process for students to enroll for the fall. The web page, located at www.ccm.edu/fall-2020, allows students to select their status – New First-Time or Visiting Student, Continuing Student or Non-Credit/Workforce Development Student – so they can clearly see the steps they need to take to enroll.

For the Fall 2020 Semester, classes are being offered in hybrid, online and remote formats, allowing students to select what works best for them. Hybrid classes consist of some on-campus time with the rest of the instruction taking place online. Online classes can be taken any day or time during the semester. Remote classes have set days and times when they meet virtually.

CCM Releases Plan to Reopen Campus

CCM this week publically released its [COVID-19 Return to Campus Fall 2020 Plan](#), which is designed to minimize risk and maximize safety for students, faculty and staff while continuing high-quality educational offerings.

“Our plan is to return thoughtfully, incrementally and with full consideration to the health and well-being of our students, employees and campus visitors,” said Dr. Anthony J. Iacono, CCM president. “The Return to Campus Plan has been carefully designed to keep the college safe as we continue to provide an exceptional educational experience for our students.”

The plan calls for no more than 25 percent of instruction to take place in person, while the majority of the college’s classes and all support services will continue to be offered virtually.

The reopening is designed to support programs that require hands-on learning, such as those in engineering and health care, while placing a priority on protecting the health and well-being of the campus community.

The plan adheres to all federal, state and local guidelines; implements guidance from the New Jersey Office of the Secretary of Higher Education, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, local health departments, and professional organizations; and incorporates recommendations from the campus community.
