





A Tech Talk with Karl Latham at CCM Hear From Acclaimed Drummer and Producer

The Department of Music, Performing Arts & Music Technologies is serving up a special treat for music lovers with a Tech Talk featuring acclaimed drummer Karl Latham, professor of music at CCM.

The talk takes place Tuesday, February 22, at 12:30 p.m. in the Music Technology Center Performance Lab. During the presentation, Latham will talk about DIY recording, releasing and more.

Latham, who also is a producer, engineer and owner of Firefly Studio, has performed, recorded and produced across many musical genres with Grammy Award winning artists, Rock and Roll Hall of Fame members and a multitude of renowned artists including The Shirelles; Johnny Winter; Bernie Worrell; John Lee Quartet with Clark Terry, Slide Hampton, Cyrus Chestnut and Jon Faddis; Ali Ryerson with Pete Levin; Jerry Vivino; Mark Egan; The Fantasy Band; Howard Paul with Laurence Hobgood, Anat Cohen and Tom Scott; The Dizzy Gillespie Alumni Group; Andy Snitzer; Vic Juris; Mitch Stein and Rachel Z.

He has performed for nearly 20 years in the groups of European musicians Wolfgang Lackerschmid and Johannes Mossinger. Latham co-led the 2016 BMW World Jazz Award nominated "Constellations" with Mark Egan and Ryan Carniaux and co-leads Don Braden/Karl Latham Big Fun(K). Karl has subbed on the Broadway productions of "Bring It On", "Hamilton", "Beautiful: The Carole King Musical", and "Ain't Too Proud."

Along with teaching at CCM, Latham is an instructor at two other New York area colleges, is an appointee to the Percussive Arts Society Education Committees and an "Approved" instructor of Gary Chester "The New Breed." He is an endorsing artist for Yamaha Drums, Paiste Cymbals, Evans Drumheads, Innovative Percussion, RME-USA, AEA Ribbonmics, Heil Sound, Primacoustic, Radial Engineering, Avantone Pro and Big Fat Snare.

The Legacy Project Presents the State of the World with Bill McKibben



Award-winning author, educator and environmentalist Bill McKibben will provide a State of the World address as the Legacy Project at CCM launches its series of engaging discussions for the Spring Semester.

The online event, which is free and open to the

public, takes place Tuesday, March 1, at 6 p.m. via Zoom.

McKibben will be giving his State of the World address a couple of hours before U.S. President Joe Biden offers his State of the Union address.

McKibben's classic work, "The End of Nature" is regarded as the first book for a general audience about climate change. Since its first publication in 1989, it has appeared in 24 languages and was reissued on its 10th anniversary.

McKibben has authored over a dozen books about climate change. He is the founder of 350.org, the first planet-wide, grassroots climate change group, having spearheaded the resistance to the Keystone XL pipeline project. The group is named after 350 parts per million — the safe concentration of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere. He is the 2013 winner of the Gandhi Peace Award and the Thomas Merton Prize. In 2014, he was awarded the Right Livelihood Prize. According to Soltes, this recognition is sometimes called the "Alternative Nobel."

A Schumann Distinguished Scholar in Environmental Studies at Middlebury College, McKibben is also a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and holds honorary degrees from 18 colleges and universities.

A New Assistance Button for Your Computer



As a part of the college's and Public Safety's efforts to expand security and safety at the campus, a new Public Safety assistance button is available for employee's computers. The software provides another avenue for employees to contact Public Safety for assistance. The college has contracted with Alertus, a leader in emergency mass notifications, to provide the service. The assistance button is available for office computers and has been added to most instructor's classroom computers. When the button is activated it sends a discreet message to the Public Safety Dispatcher that you need assistance.

To have the Alertus assistance button software added to your computer or to a classroom instructor's computer, submit a request to the Solution Center. Once the software has been installed, contact Public Safety at ext. 5550 to test the panic button.

A Health Coverage Premium Holiday

The New Jersey Department of the Treasury recently announced a premium contribution "holiday" for employers and members of the New Jersey School Employees Health Benefits Program (SEHBP).

The SEHBP Commission approved a contribution "holiday" for February 2022 for school districts and county colleges that participate in SEHBP.

CCM employees currently participating will not have a health benefit contribution taken from their paychecks on February 10 and 24. You can read the FAQ here.

A Reminder: Beginning this year, the college has changed the health benefit premium deductions to match all benefit deductions which are taken from the first two pays each month (24 times for those paid over 12 months and 20 times for those paid over 10 months). Therefore, any month when there are three paychecks, only the first two will have benefit deductions. Previously health benefit deductions were taken from every pay period.
