Data Science Night: Data Under the Stars

CCM will be hosting a free Data Science Night: Data Under the Stars event where participants can learn about the field of data science, artificial intelligence and the Data Analytics Certificate Program offered at the college. It is open to students 15 and older and adults interested in exploring career options. No prior experience is needed.

The event takes place Thursday, October 13, from 6 to 9:30 p.m., in Sheffield Hall, Room 200. Refreshments will be served.

"Data science is an exciting field that helps to answer society's important questions," notes Professor Nancy Binowski, Information Technologies.

Professor Kelly Fitzpatrick, Mathematics, who developed CCM's Data Analytics Certificate Program, adds, "We have put together this program to provide students and adults with an opportunity to learn about this dynamic and rewarding field and the range of career options that are available."

The program, sponsored by the Data Analytics Certificate Program and the college's Women in STEM and Computer Science clubs, is supported with a grant from the National Science Foundation and funding from the New Jersey Council of County Colleges, NJ Pathways Center for Workforce Innovation in Data Science.

CCM Planetarium Shows October 7 – December 17



Since 1973, the Longo Planetarium has been bringing the stars to Northern New Jersey. Here you can explore the Universe from the Earth and other planets in our Solar System to stars, galaxies and beyond. The Digistar projection system can display thousands of stars, the planets and the Moon onto a 33-foot diameter dome. All are welcome to attend public programs; programs for school, camp and scout groups can also be scheduled in advance.

The fall schedule features the following public programs on the second and fourth weekends of the month (note schedule adjustments due to the Thanksgiving and Winter Breaks).

Cosmix

Friday at 7 p.m. and Saturday at 2:30 p.m. Recommended for children ages 5-8, 30 minutes

Have you ever wondered what it is like to be an astronaut? This 14-minute animated trip into space is a spectacular journey to the International Space Station. You will learn how to sleep in space, cook astronaut food, take a zero-g shower and use a cosmic toilet! In the second part of the show, you will learn about what it is like to be an astronomer with an amazing live tour of the nighttime sky, its constellations and stars, plus a lesson on how to find the planets.

Forward to the Moon – NEW!

Friday at 8:30 p.m. and Saturday at 5:30 p.m. Recommended for adults and children ages 9+, 45 minutes

NASA's 21st century Artemis program, named after the Greek moon Goddess, is the next step in our mission to explore the universe and land the astronauts back on the surface of the Moon for the first time in more than 50 years. Using innovative technologies to explore more of the lunar surface than ever before, NASA plans to use what they learn on the Moon to take the next giant leap: sending the first astronauts to Mars. This 30-minute voyage to the Moon is followed by a short tour of the night sky and planets.

This show was produced by the University of Colorado's Fiske Planetarium in collaboration with TEND Studio and is narrated by Kari Byron from "Crash Test World" and "MythBusters."

This 30-minute voyage through space is followed by a short tour of the night sky and planets.
