CCM Broadcast Students Create "Garden State of the Arts" Series Featuring New Jersey Artists Talking About Their Creative Journey

CCM employees, residents across New Jersey and others can gain new insight into the world of several regional artists through the "Garden State of the Arts" (GSOA) broadcast series created by CCM students enrolled in the college's TV2 class.

Each semester, Professor Ray Kalas asks his TV2 students to produce a special project series. The Spring 2023 Semester students opted to produce five episodes for a GSOA series featuring artists from the region.

"I am so proud of the work the students did," said Kalas. "Their episodes are among the very best my students have ever produced."

The episodes and the students who produced them are:

- <u>GSOA with Michael Lancellotti</u>, who talks about his development as an artist, produced by Joey Lancellotti and Julia Gosden.
- <u>GSOA with Victor Lake</u>, a young fashion designer, who speaks about designing and founding the Smouth Brand, produced by Payton Reid and Michael Prada.
- <u>GSOA with Sherry Carnegie</u>, who talks about her passion for teaching art, produced by Kaitlin McGraw and Devon Lane.
- <u>GSOA with Bob Richardson</u>, who speaks about creating sculptures from things people throw away, produced by Brandon Lee and Zachary Spina.
- <u>GSOA with Todd Doney</u>, CCM Fine Arts professor, who talks about his creative journey and the satisfaction he gets from working with students and their shared journey of discovery, produced by Kevin Roe and Christian Russomanno.

The Production Coordinator for the series was Stephen Keltos.

"It was very satisfying," said Reid about his work on the episode with Lancellotti and what he learned in the class. "It was a good experience from start to finish, from finding the talent and then bringing it all together in the studio."

Campus Construction Updates

<u>Academic Complex Elevators and 3rd Floor Walkway</u> The underpinning work is complete, and the elevator shaft footings are formed. Next week the footings for the shaft will be poured and the foundation wall work will begin soon after.

Interior footing excavation work is proceeding on schedule, and we have discovered some hidden conduits under, and within, the first-floor slabs that were not visible in the penetrating radar scans. When this happens, we might temporarily lose power or HVAC control in certain areas unexpectedly. As you would normally, please reach out to Plant & Maintenance at ext. 5500 if you find you have a partial loss of power, or the HVAC system is not acting as you would normally expect. We have been able to restore systems relatively quickly, but the sooner Plant knows the sooner they can get things restored. The concrete slab removal where they have identified conduits through slab scans will continue for the next three weeks. While they are less likely to hit conduits in these areas, the work will potentially be noisier than the previous two weeks.

Concrete trucks will be onsite starting next week to pour footings inside and outside the building. In approximately three weeks, they plan on pouring the second-floor ramps adjacent to the elevator shafts, so expect some detours around that area of the second floor.

Public Safety and Plant are continuing to work on updating caution and detour signage as the work shifts within the buildings. If you have any concerns, please call Business & Finance at ext. 5012 so your questions or concerns can be directed to the correct department/person.

To keep informed of the construction progress throughout the summer, please check the CCMemo for regular updates. In early July, the college expects to have a more precise schedule for the crane operation. We again thank the campus community for your assistance with preparing for the summer construction schedule. As communicated over the last few years, the completed project will provide much-needed accessibility (ADA) access to the third floors of Cohen, Sheffield and DeMare halls with larger elevator cabs and a connection between the buildings' third floors. The third-floor connections will improve circulation and provide additional options for emergency egress. The old elevators and equipment rooms will be converted to fully ADAcompliant gender-neutral (all gender) single-stall restrooms and additional building storage. This project is funded through the college's Chapter 12 appropriation and was approved by Morris County.
