#### Admission Requirements to the Rutgers Professional Program:

The admissions process is **highly competitive** and meeting the minimal requirements **does not guarantee admission to Rutgers**.

1. Applicants should have achieved a cumulative GPA of at least 2.5 in their pre-professional coursework (recommended 3.0 GPA).
2. Applicant transcript must document that courses in Developmental Psychology/Lifespan and Human Anatomy and Physiology have been completed during the past five years. Alternatively, applicants can submit documentation that knowledge from Human Anatomy and Physiology and/or Developmental Psychology/Lifespan has been used in employment situation during the past five years.
3. Applicant must submit documentation of a minimum of 20 hours of volunteer experience in two different settings where occupational therapy services are provided (for example, choose an option either children and youth, or adult rehabilitation).
4. Applicant must submit two letters of recommendation:
  - a. One from a college advisor or a professional supervisor or superior that verifies, if appropriate, a plan for completion of prerequisite courses.
  - b. One from an Occupational Therapy Assistant or an Occupational Therapist.
5. Applicant must write and submit an essay justifying OTA as a career choice, reflecting on volunteer experience, prerequisite coursework, and other community service.
6. If invited, an applicant must complete a personal interview with Rutgers OTA Admissions Committee.
7. Applicants who did not attend secondary school in the US or have not completed a sufficient number of college level English courses are required to take the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL). Acceptable scores for TOEFL are as follows: 550 and above for paper based test and 79 for Internet based test. All results must be forwarded directly to SHRP from the testing agency.

Please note: A felony conviction may affect a graduate's ability to sit for the NBCOT certification examination or attain state licensure.

Authorization to conduct a criminal background check and results deemed favorable by Rutgers and/or clinical facilities are conditions for admission and continued enrollment.
