Montclair State math professor energizes others

Dr. Evan Maletsky, Professor Emeritus, Montclair State University captivated an audience of more than 130 mathematics teachers with his hands-on presentation at a meeting of the Morris Area Mathematics Alliance (MAMA) on October 9 in the SCC. He spoke about his *Reflections and Reactions from Fifty Years of Teaching Mathematics* and his predictions for the future. Participants commented: “Dr. Maletsky is amazing!” “He is fascinating, dynamic, inspiring, energetic and engaging.” “He made you think about the fun and elegance of math.” “He truly has a passion for teaching math.” “I can’t wait to do this in class.”
