## CCM Trustees Amend Admissions Policy Regarding Undocumented Students

At its April 20, 2011 meeting, the County College of Morris (CCM) Board of Trustees amended the college's admissions policy with a 9 – 2 vote to require undocumented students to pay the out-of-state tuition rate rather than tuition based on their place of residency.

The vote was based on a report from the trustees' Minority Enrollment and Retention Committee. That report noted that the "current prevailing interpretation of federal immigration law is that undocumented individuals not be granted resident tuition rates unless a state statute affirmatively authorizes resident tuition rates." The report further noted, "Guidance and resolution of this weighty public policy must come from the judicial or legislative branches." When such guidance and resolution are presented, the report stated, the board should then again review the tuition rate for undocumented students.

The board's vote came after a two-hour public session where more than 50 people expressed their opinions on the proposed change.

Board Chair Elaine Johnson and Trustee Michael Van Allen cast the two "no" votes. Prior to the vote, Van Allen explained that he would be voting "no" because of "legal, financial and moral issues." Prior to

the vote, Johnson explained that she felt it was unfair to create a system that would charge different rates for Morris County high schools graduates based on whether they were born in this country or brought here by their parents as undocumented children. “That is just wrong,” she said.

As part of the vote, the board also established that the enrollment of undocumented individuals be limited to those who have graduated from a New Jersey high school or have attained a GED or equivalent diploma in New Jersey. Doing so, the committee’s report stated, will “provide a continuum of educational opportunity primarily for students who have been educated in New Jersey and are likely to contribute to the New Jersey community.”

The April 20 vote amended the admissions policy changes that were adopted by the board at its Feb. 16 meeting. That vote stipulated that undocumented students should pay tuition based on their place of residence.

## **International Students Association Celebrates Arbor Day 2011 with Tree Planting at CCM**

### **50 Seedlings to be Planted on College Campus**

The already picturesque County College of Morris (CCM) campus is about to get even more lush with the planting of 50 trees by the International Students Association.

In celebration of Arbor Day 2011, the student group will be planting Eastern Redbuds (*Cercis Canadensis*) and Willow Oaks (*Quercus Phellos*) in various locations across campus on Saturday, April 30, from 9:30 a.m. to noon.

The college obtained the tree seedlings from the New Jersey Tree Foundation, which celebrates Arbor Day each year by providing schools, local governments, nonprofit organizations and volunteer groups with the opportunity to apply for free trees. All plantings must occur on public lands, be completed by volunteers and maintained for two years.

"The International Students Association wanted to do something to express their appreciation for the natural beauty of the CCM campus," said Rita Ragany-Bayer, associate director of Human Resources and advisor to the student group. "The planting of additional trees is a wonderful way for the students to leave something of lasting value for future students to enjoy."

The planting will begin with a short training session on the proper technique for planting tree seedlings. Volunteers then will break out into groups and move to different sites throughout campus to do the plantings.

Since the program's inception, the foundation's "Celebrate Arbor Day!" program has led to the planting of more than 121,000 trees in parks, schools and public spaces across the state.

Martin E. Segal Award Announcement – The Martin E. Segal Award was established upon Segal's retirement as chairman of Lincoln Center for The Performing Arts in New York City by Lincoln Center's Board and a group of Segal's friends and colleagues.

Since the awards inauguration in 1987, Lincoln Center's Arts Organizations have been asked to nominate an artist or ensemble for the Martin Segal Award. Segal called the award "a recognition of those who demonstrate great artistry and great promise." Karen Notare was the first recipient of the Martin E. Segal Award. Notare was nominated by Beverly Sills of the New York City Opera for Notare's debut as "Madam Butterfly."

The 25th Anniversary Martin E. Segal Award Luncheon, which is an annual recognition of outstanding young artists at Lincoln Center, was held on March 28 at the Stanley H. Kaplan Penthouse in the Samuel B. and David Rose Building at Lincoln Center in New York City. Karen Notare was a guest of honor as she had been the first recipient of this very prestigious award.
