Professor Todd Doney's Paintings Included in Mansion in May Showcase



Several paintings by Todd Doney, professor of fine arts, are on display at the Mansion in May "Splendor in September" designer showcase at Tyvan Hill in New Vernon.

The preeminent designer showcase in the New Jersey metropolitan area runs this year until October 4. Doney, a community college graduate, is an award-winning artist who is widely known for his vivid Neo-Impressionistic paintings. His work has been displayed in numerous exhibitions, including a previous Mansion in May showcase; Drumthwacket, the governor's mansion; and the Morris Museum.



The Commemoration Committee is a new committee at the college that recognizes, raises awareness and understanding of diverse groups, cultures and histories. Emphasis is placed on hearing voices from the CCM community. In recognition of this, the committee is presenting a talk by Dr. Stuart Siegelman from the Languages and ESL department for Hispanic Heritage Month. He will present via Zoom on Thursday, October 8, at 12:30 p.m. on "Language and Latinx Identity: The Power of the Mother Tongue."

Siegelman explains, "Gloria Anzaldúa, a noted Mexican-American poet and essayist, writes, 'So, if you want to really hurt me, talk badly about my language. Ethnic identity is twin to linguistic identity – I am my language. Until I can take pride in my language, I cannot take pride in myself.' The truth of this statement may be supported by interviews, statistics and research, but Latinx literature provides a quicker, surer and more heartfelt path to understanding the power of the mother tongue."
