Policy Regarding Commemorative Plaques

1. Scholarships honoring individuals that have a building named for them shall be allowed to have such plaques placed near their icon within that building.

Examples: DeMare Hall and the DeMare Scholarship

Henderson Hall and the Henderson/Masten Scholarship

- 2. All such plaques will be of a consistent and similar design done by an outside agency specializing in such awards. They may be bronze, or of wood design. The design will be recommended to the Foundation membership for their consideration.
- 3. The cost of the plaque will be borne by the scholarship donor or from the interest generated by the scholarship at the donor's request.
- 4. Other plaques may be used based upon criteria established by the Foundation Board and shall be reserved for endorsed scholarships only. A vote of the Foundation Board, upon the request of the donor to have such a plaque, will establish the right to have such an award.
- 5. In order to maintain consistency and control, scholarship plaques will be the privilege of the Foundation as certain criteria, such as an endowment, will be applied. The amount of such an endowment to allow the privilege of a plaque will be determined by the Foundation.
- 6. Plaques commemorating deceased members of the college community or scholarship plaques in their honor (such as the Morris Lieff Science Prize) shall remain the purview of the Administration and the Board of Trustees.
